

DESIDERATA



Purpose:

- Relaxation and quiet time.
- An opportunity to 'go within'.

Requirements:

- Stereo system (tape & CD) capable of producing good quality sound.
- Sound track of "Desiderata", by Les Craine (available on CD 'Love Serenade'). Contact Erica if you're unable to obtain a copy.

Format:

- Ask the children to lie on the floor or sit comfortably.
- Explain that they are going to hear the voice of a man speaking to them, with music in between his paragraphs about them being 'a child of the universe'.
- Ask them to simply relax and listen.
- On completion of the sound track, ask the children to reflect on and feedback what they have just heard.
- How do they feel? What are they thinking? What meaning did it have for them?



DESIDERATA

The words on the sound track are as follows.



Go placidly amid the noise and haste, and remember what peace there may be in silence. As far as possible without surrender be on good terms with all persons. Speak your truth quietly and clearly; and listen to others, even the dull and ignorant; they too have their story.

Avoid loud and aggressive persons, they are vexations to the spirit. If you compare yourself with others, you may become vain and bitter; for always there will be greater and lesser persons than yourself. Enjoy your achievements as well as your plans.

Keep interested in your own career, however humble; it is a real possession in the changing fortunes of time. Exercise caution in your business affairs; for the world is full of trickery. But let this not blind you to what virtue there is; many persons strive for high ideals; and everywhere life is full of heroism.

Be yourself. Especially do not feign affection. Neither be cynical about love; for in the face of all aridity and disenchantment it is perennial as the grass.

Take kindly the counsel of the years, gracefully surrendering the things of youth. Nurture strength of spirit to shield you in sudden misfortune. But do not distress yourself with imaginings. Many fears are born of fatigue and loneliness. Beyond a wholesome discipline, be gentle with yourself.

You are a child of the universe, no less than the trees and the stars; you have a right to be here. And whether or not it is clear to you, no doubt the universe is unfolding as it should.

Therefore be at peace with God, whatever you conceive Him to be, and whatever your labours and aspirations, in the noisy confusion of life keep peace with your soul.

With all its sham, drudgery and broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world. Be careful. Strive to be happy.
